Democracy and Diversity

This course will engage you in recognizing and applying inclusive leadership practices and frameworks to thrive in the workplace, community, and relationships. Through service and collaboration, the leadership principles and theories will be grounded in best practices aimed at increasing diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI)--outcomes highly valued in 21st century organizations and teams. Facilitated conversations, group discussions, and assigned readings will challenge you to develop a critical understanding of what it takes to be an inclusive leader and achieve success in complex political, social, and economic environments.

Integrative Seminar: Athens 403 B.C.

ONL Section 8/16/23 - 10/10/23 ONL2 Section 10/16/23 - 12/16/23 cap 5 each

This is a course that examines the political philosophies within the democracy of ancient Athens at the end of the Peloponnesian War. After experiencing a devastating conflict with Sparta, the city-state of Athens was in the throes of a crisis that threatened their democratic form of government. This class will offer a simulation of competing ideologies in order to test the durability of democracies along with which ideas gain the most traction in times of duress.

LAR-303-1

Reflections of Life in the Face of Mortality

This course will seek to answer this question: how does contemplating death give meaning to life? Mortality is the great equalizer. It unites humanity across every social and cultural divide, and connects us uniquely with all sentient life forms on the planet. It is the common core of many faith systems and the impetus for modern civilization, the various ways we choose to organize ourselves and govern our collective behavior. We will examine what it means to be aware of our own mortality - how facing it may enrich our lives - and then work together to help others do the same.

LAR-303-2 & 3

Philosophy as a Mechanism for Problem Solving

"Life is to be lived, not controlled; and humanity is won by continuing to play in the face of certain defeat." This course concludes the final steps of the LAR experience at Doane. Through the primary lenses of Plato and Joseph Campbell (and the secondary lenses of Shelley, Thoreau, Emerson, Ellison, Dostoevsky, Nietzsche, Hegel, Rousseau, and various philosophies of religion), this course will examine the complex process one must go through internally before literally taking action to revivify communities.

LAR-303-4 Behavioral Approach to Decision Making Lee
M/W/F 11:00-11:50AM

This course is designed to provide an introduction to the methods and applications of behavioral decision-making for future consultants, managers, and business owners. Behavioral decision-making incorporates research from psychology, economics, and management to study how we make decisions. Students will conduct collaborative research in decision theory and participate in small/large group discussions to examine how people actually make decisions and how we can improve their decision-making. Topics may include heuristics & biases in decision-making, information search in decisions under uncertainty and risk, and experience-based decisions in evolving environments.

LAR-303-ONL/ONL2 Understanding Refugees and Forced Migration Hoffman
ONL Section 8/16/23 - 10/10/23 ONL2 Section 10/16/23 - 12/16/23 cap 5 each

This course will develop students' teamwork and leadership skills to prepare for citizenship or work as they connect theory, practice and experience. Students, drawn from multiple fields of specialized study, will collaboratively analyze a complex real-world problem, develop an empathetic understanding of multiple perspectives needed to comprehend the issue, and propose possible solutions.

Selected Topics

ART/GDC-271-1 Digital Content Creation (3 cr.) Canfield
T 6:00-9:00PM

Through digitally focused projects students will learn skills in creating content for social media and interactive experiences, like websites. They will utilize Adobe software and their camera phones to create still imagery and 4D works ranging from documentary style videos to more experimental applications.

BIO-371-1 Phage Genome Publication (2 cr.) Bowder/Doyle
T/TH 11:00-12:15PM cap 14

Students will work together to write and submit a publication to the peer-reviewed journal Genome Announcements. This class builds on work done in BIO-271 Phage Genome Annotation. Students will conduct comparative genomics analysis of the phage genomes annotated in BIO 271. Then, they will work together to write and submit a manuscript describing those genomes to a scientific journal. Upon completion of the class, students will be able to conduct background literature searches, perform critical reading to evaluate sources, and outline and write a scientific publication according to a journal's specific requirements. Additionally, students will gain valuable first-hand understanding of what it means for an article to be "peer-reviewed". Student in the class will be names as authors on the resulting publication.

EGR-371-1 Introduction to Structural Analysis (3 cr.) Leon
M/W/F 10:00-10:50AM cap 24

As a first course in structural engineering, this class introduces structural concepts such as design loads and load paths for building and other structures, as well as an overview of specific techniques for analyzing trusses, determinate and indeterminate beams, and plane frame structures. Structural analysis involves the application of concepts from calculus, statics, and mechanics of materials to determine internal forces and deflections of structural members and systems. After completing this course, students will be able to calculate the shear, bending moment and displacement of determinate and indeterminate beams and frames, analysis plane truss and use structural analysis software. Pre-requisite: EGR-218

SOC-271-1 Reading and Writing Sociology (3 cr.) Erickson
M/W/F 9:00-9:50AM cap 15

This course will prepare students to become more proficient writers for the sociology major. Students will read and analyze a variety of sociological literature while also practicing their writing skills.
