1 MAC PROGRAM RECEIVES CACREP ACCREDITATION

Doane's Master of Arts in Counseling (MAC) program was granted accreditation by the primary U.S. accrediting body for clinical mental health counseling: the Council for Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs (CACREP). The accreditation is backdated to Jan. 14, 2020, due to delays in the process due to the COVID-19 pandemic and grandfathers in all graduates of the program starting from that date. The MAC program first started offering courses in fall 1995, with seven students in the first graduating class. To date, there have been 753 graduates of the program, which is housed on Doane's Lincoln campus location. The process was first approved by Doane's Board of Trustees in 2009 — which feels like a much longer period of time than it actually is, in terms of developing an accredited program.

"The journey is truly meaningful to us," said Dr. Courtney East, national certified counselor (NCC) and MAC program director and assistant professor. "It's amazing that there was so much buy-in that long ago to shape this program, that faculty, students, administration and our community partners held that long-term vision and commitment to make the program what it is today."

2 SOPHOMORE WINS NATIONAL FORENSICS CHAMPIONSHIP

Alexandria "Ali" Moulton '24 was Doane's first-ever American Forensic Association National Speech Tournament (AFA-NST) champion, winning in poetry interpretation. The tournament was held April 1-4 at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. All five members of the team — Moulton, Walker Stuhr '22, Dani Avalos '24, Olivia Vore '24 and Erik Rodriguez '23 — qualified one or more events for the national tournament, which contributed enough points to put Doane in 18th place for the team sweepstakes. Additionally, Stuhr reached quarterfinals in after-dinner speaking. The team is coached by Nathaniel Wilson, director of forensics and assistant professor of communications, and Jennifer Torres, assistant director of forensics.

3 DOANE THEATRE MARKS YEAR OF SUCCESS

The Theatre Department and students received multiple awards and recognition as part of the 2022 National Awards of the Kennedy Center American College Theater Festival (KCACTF). Jimmy Nguyen '20 was also one of three co-hosts for the national awards ceremony on May 21. In total, the department's production of "Lonely Planet", produced and recorded in spring 2021, received eight national honors:

- The Citizen Artist Award
- Special Achievement in the Production of a Play
- Cecilia Ceci Barr '22 was recognized for Special Achievement in Scenic Design
- Lauren Walther '22 was recognized for Special Achievement in Lighting Design
- Patrick Sedivy '19 was recognized for Special Achievement in Sound Design
- Special Achievement in Production and Performance Ensemble Unity
- Mason Morrill '22 was recognized for Special Achievement in Direction by Student Artists
- Wyatt Jorgensen '22 was recognized for Special Achievement in Individual Performance

Including these, Doane Theatre has been recognized with 144 major regional and national KCACTF awards. The production of "Lonely Planet" and "The Theory of Relativity" collectively received 10 awards earlier this year at the Region 5 KCACTF; Nicole Carraher '23 was also named a semi-finalist for the KCACTF Irene Ryan Acting Scholarship.

"Reefer Madness," Doane's spring 2022 musical production, also wowed audiences in April, with four standing ovations and two sold-out performances. Two students, Logan Capek '24 and Percy Earle '24, were also nominated for the KCACTF Irene Ryan Acting Scholarship, which awards 16 regional and two national scholarships annually. A Kennedy Center rep from Omaha's Rose Theater said Doane's was *"the best production I've seen in college theatre this season."*

4 13TH PRESIDENT INAUGURATED IN APRIL

Dr. Roger Hughes '82 was officially inaugurated as Doane's 13th president on April 30. The event capped off We Build Leaders Week, which included a leadership visit day for students from Crete, Norris and Seward Public Schools, a Doane Forensics showcase, and speeches throughout the afternoon and evening of April 27 for the Education and Leadership Symposiums.

5 NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION BROADN RESEARCH

Dr. Erin Doyle, associate professor of biology, and students Matthew Morben '24, Sierra Laschanzky '25 and Lindsay Adams '25 spent the summer working with teams from Colorado State University and several other institutions to learn more about microbes that live in the air, also known as the aerobiome. The National Science Foundation (NSF) awarded \$12.5 million to CSU to lead the interdisciplinary research program, titled the Biology Integration Institute Regional OneHealth Aerobiome Discovery Network — BROADN, for short. The NSF grant stipulated partnerships to encourage undergraduate research at other colleges and universities.

6 \$600,000 NSF GRANT SUPPORTS STEM EDUCATION

Three Doane faculty members are leading an NSF Improving Undergraduate STEM Education grant titled, "Developing Computational Efficacy and Skill Within an Inclusive Community of Practice in the Natural Sciences." The goal of the \$600,000 grant is to create the Digital Imaging and Vision Applications in Science Alliance (DIVAS), which will establish standard practices that can be tailored by partner campuses to develop students' computational skills. DIVAS scholars will learn how to analyze various types of image data within a community interacting in-person and virtually. They will gain skills increasingly valuable and necessary for their future careers. The grant began in July and continues through the summer of 2025. Dr. Tessa Durham Brooks, professor of biology, is the co-principal investigator along with Dr. Raychelle Burks of American University. Dr. Mark Meysenburg, professor of computing, and Dr. Erin Doyle, associate professor of biology, are also involved with the project. Doane will partner with four other institutions — the University of Nebraska at Kearney, the University of Nebraska Omaha, the University of the District of Columbia and the University of Michigan.

7 DOANE RECEIVES NEH GRANT

The National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH) awarded Doane a \$499,116 grant in October 2021 to develop a new Department of Ethics and Interfaith Studies, led by Dr. Dan Clanton, associate professor of religious studies, and to expand a current project supported by NEH funds, the Certificate in Integrated Humanities Program (CIHP), led by Dr. Jared List, associate professor of Spanish. The creation of the new department allows Doane to develop ethics and interfaith studies as a new, interdisciplinary academic program. Through it, students will explore the intersection of religions, ethical traditions and issues, and cultures to better understand the world and its diversity. The CIHP creates pathways for students in Doane's non-humanities and pre-professional programs to discover how the humanities and social sciences benefit their chosen vocations. The program is currently offering a pathway addressing opioids and addiction with additional pathways in the future.

8 DOANE STUDENTS PRESENT RESEARCH FOR CIC GRANT

Through a \$10,000 grant from the Council of Independent Colleges (CIC), students Travis Handler '22, Anabelle Daugherty '24, PJ Ramsey '23, Garrett Cornwell '22, Marilu Garcia '23, Mandi Laib '23 and Erin Benal '22 worked with Dr. Kim Jarvis, professor of history, and Cali Neuberger Biaggi '14, online learning librarian, to research and publicly present, "The Flora of the Nebraska Tallgrass Prairie: Past and Present." The grant was part of the CIC's Humanities Research for the Public Good, supported by the Andrew Mellon Foundation, and promoted undergraduate research drawing on institutional archives. Topics had to be of local interest and research had to be shared with the public — Dr. Jarvis and five students presented their findings on April 3 at the Spring Creek Prairie Audubon Center, an 850-acre tallgrass prairie a short drive from Doane.

9 AGRIBUSINESS PROGRAM CONTINUES TO GROW

Since its launch in 2019, the Agribusiness Department has steadily grown its course and extracurricular offerings. During the 2021-22 academic year, an Agricultural Industry Advisory Board comprised of 12 professionals actively working in the field was created to provide input to the program. Research funded by the A.R. Kinney Endowment for Business and Economics titled "Understanding Student Connectedness in Agribusiness Online Courses at Doane" began in summer 2022, led by Sydney Erickson '24 and Pete Poppert, chair of the Agribusiness Department. Three new courses were added for the 2022-23 academic year in addition to the six existing courses.



10 NUMEROUS FACULTY ACCOMPLISHMENTS IN 2021-22

During the 2021-22 academic year, Doane faculty published at least 10 articles in academic journals and were invited to present research at 15 conferences or institutions. In addition to the CIC, BROADN, NEH and NSF grants, Dr. Brad Elder, professor of biology, is completing a \$20,000 award for malaria reduction through home construction sponsored by Habitat for Humanity. Three faculty members also gave public performances in their fields — Joel Egger, assistant professor of theatre, was cast in the March 2022 production of "This Mortal Life Also" at the Lied Center's Carson Theater in Lincoln, Nebraska; adjunct professor of flute Bridget Hill performed in, "She Sings: Music by Women Composers" in May 2022 at Calvary United Methodist in Lincoln; emeritus professor Dr. Tom King presented a Chautauqua performance to Crete second grade students on the American Civil War as President Ulysses Grant, and again to the Crete Public Library as Andrew Carnegie.

11 STUDENTS CONFRONT VACCINE MISINFORMATION

From July through December 2021, 11 Doane students and alumni from Crete and Lincoln joined more than 2,000 students across the U.S. in advocating for and busting myths about the COVID-19 vaccine in partnership with community and faith-based organizations. The initiative was led by the Interfaith Youth Core. Each ambassador was challenged to share information about the vaccines and access to vaccination clinics, and given a stipend to plan and implement projects. Doane students led social media campaigns, designed infographics about the vaccines, and volunteered at local clinics to provide logistical support and interpretation, among other projects.

12 COB LAUNCHES NEW LEADERSHIP CERTIFICATE

The College of Business introduced a Leadership Studies Certificate in fall 2021 and had its first four recipients this spring. The 10-credit certificate blends real-world experience with academics, to enhance a student's leadership capabilities whether in the process of completing their undergraduate degree or as a way to bolster their knowledge for a promotion or career change. The certificate is completed asynchronously during four eight-week courses, two in the fall and two in the spring, so it can be finished in one year. Although online, the certificate centers experiential learning as students support a non-profit organization, which provides tangible outcomes and students can talk about relating to leadership, communication and the creation of deliverables.

"The flexibility of completing the courses online while still engaging community partners is perfect for a post-pandemic world," said Dr. Jared Cook, assistant professor and chair of the leadership department. "As those barriers between online and face-to-face break down, the ability to engage clients and colleagues in either arena is essential and this certificate helps students do just that."

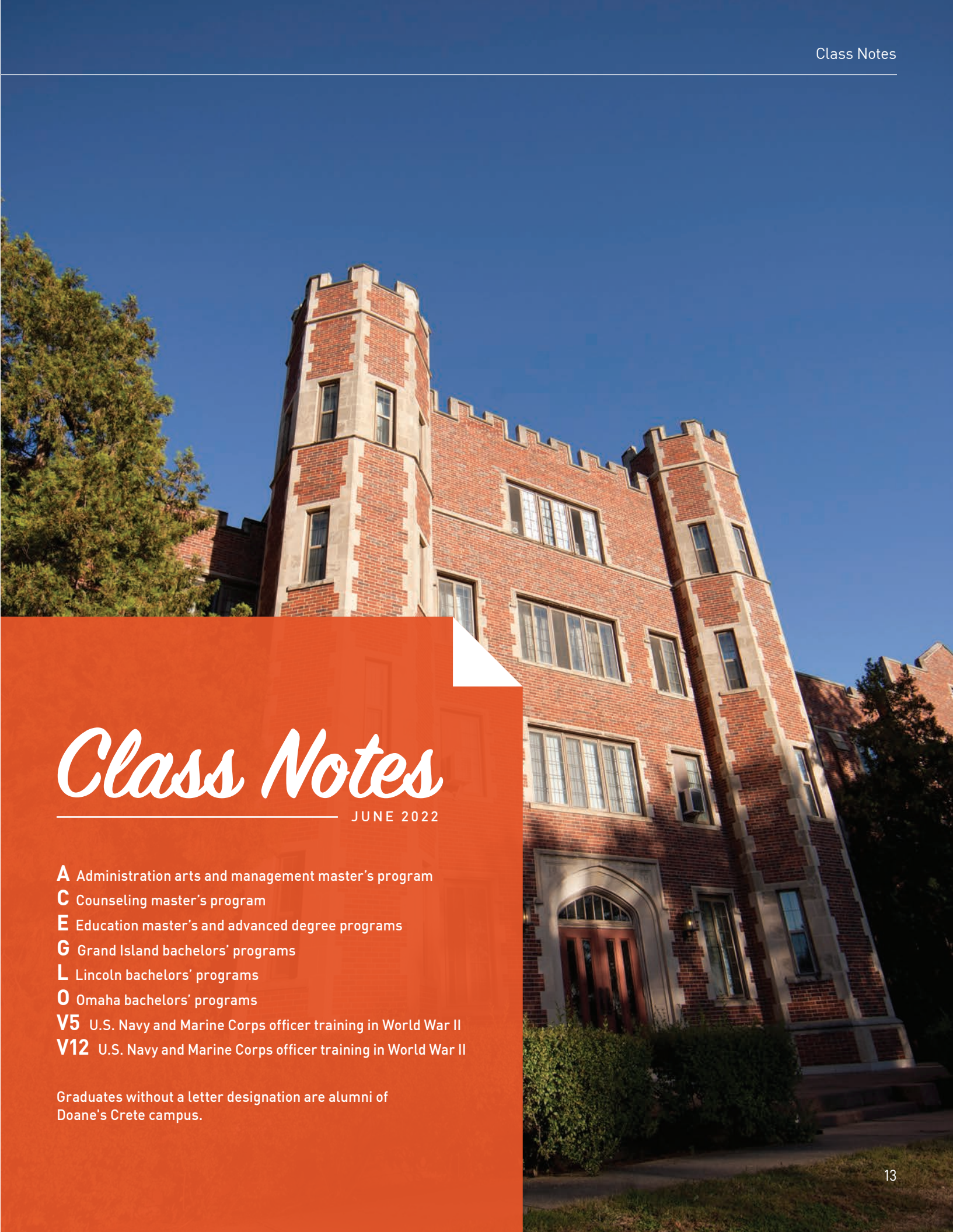

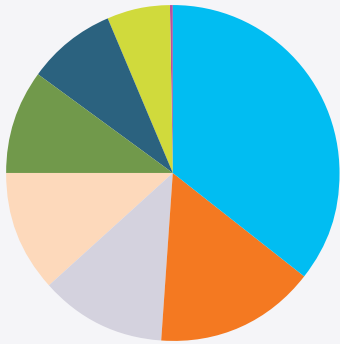

ENDOWMENTS

An endowment is a permanent investment that generates funds to be used, in perpetuity, to support Doane University, our students and programs. This may seem like a major investment — and it is, for the future of the university and generations of Tigers — but also one that fiscally, may already be in your reach. To start, establishing an endowed fund requires giving or pledging \$25,000 or more, over a period of up to five years.

Endowments can support a scholarship, specific programs or remain unrestricted to support the areas of greatest need,

in perpetuity. For donors, these contributions create a lasting legacy for themselves, for a loved one, or for friends and family. Each endowment is invested so that year-by-year, the fund grows while allowing a yearly spend rate currently set at 5%.

Endowments can also create lasting relationships with the students, faculty members and Doane community who benefit from the award. For example, our Endowment Dinner creates an opportunity for recipients to meet benefactors supporting their education, research or projects — and for benefactors to learn about the ways Doane supported their or a loved one’s education.

HOW DOES DOANE INVEST AND SPEND THE ENDOWMENT?

An endowment fund created at Doane is permanent and meant to provide support forever. The yearly income of each fund is called the spend amount, and is based on the average fund balance from a three-year period, which keeps fluctuations in the market in check. Currently, the spend rate is set at 5%. Because the average return on investments is higher, the fund will grow organically, which allows the average fund balance to grow, and in turn grows the amount awarded. At any time, anyone can contribute to an existing fund or start a new one.
