Q&A WITH A FOUR-TIME DOANE GRADUATE



She Bleeds Orange

A four-time graduate on why she chose Doane — and keeps coming back

Erica Johnson first graduated from Doane in 2003, with a degree in special education with an early childhood education endorsement. She returned in 2005 for her Master of Education in Curriculum & Instruction. And again in 2011 and 2018 for masters in Educational Leadership and Education Specialist. Johnson now leads all special education programs for North Platte Public Schools, as director of special education.

What initially drew you to Doane?

Three things — my older sister, Erin Clasen '00, was a senior when I was a freshman. Doane is also known to be an education school, so if you're going to go into teaching, it's one of the top schools to look at. I also played basketball at Doane and really enjoy sports.

And what brought you back for your graduate degrees?

I love Doane. I love the philosophy in the education programs. It is hands-on learning, it's real learning, it's reflective thinking. All of those things are the Doane way.

Doane also hones in on leadership, and that was one of the other reasons I came back. Educational Leadership wasn't about being a principal, Education Specialist wasn't about being a superintendent. These programs teach you how you can lead in whatever capacity you want.

You're known to say you "bleed orange." What does that mean to you?

My older sister and I say that to each other every now and then whenever we talk about Doane. It was our home! It's where I spent four amazing years, and I loved it so much I just kept going back. What advice do you have for our 2024 graduates?

Take everything that you learn and apply it to the real world. Even if you think it's not going to work, or you think it's silly, give it a try because there is a philosophy and evidence supporting what you've been taught.

What else would you like people to know?

Your path is your path, and that's what Doane is all about. It's not about 'what's the next step.' It's about taking your path and your journey. And that's what I really enjoy about Doane.



In addition to her academics, Alexis was the president of Psych/Soc Club, the mediator and secretary of Gamma Phi Iota, an admissions ambassador, a community adviser, and a member of the Leadership Program and Doane Leadership Educators.

"They really took me in [and] Doane became my family," Hamilton said of her university experience.

Through her time at Doane, Hamilton was able to build lasting relationships with students and professors.

"They helped allow me to believe in myself and my opinions when it came to things, so not only do I know how to speak up for myself but I can speak up for these families," Hamilton said of two psychology professors, Dr. Jocelyn Schock King and Dr. Heather Lambert.

The community adviser position proved to be a valuable experience as well. Hamilton was able to see firsthand issues which gave her the foundation to understand her current job. This involvement is nothing short of extraordinary and provided a transition to life after college.

Currently, Hamilton is a family development and self-sufficiency specialist at West Central Community Action in Council Bluffs, Iowa. This agency develops programs that help families reach self-sufficiency.

"It is really hard for families to dig themselves out of poverty," Hamilton said.

This job allows her to help families get on their feet. In time, she hopes to work with foster children.

Hamilton is also the assistant wrestling coach at Marian High School in Omaha, where Martha Hinneh became the school's first state champion in girls' wrestling. Girls' wrestling didn't become a sanctioned sport through the Nebraska State Athletics Association until 2021. Alexis says she's happy watching these girls compete on the big stage as wrestling was a huge constant in her life for over six years as a kid.


DOUBLE DOANE GRAD AWARDED THE PRESTIGIOUS MILKEN EDUCATOR AWARD

Leslie McIntosh '18E, '22E, an educator and Doane University alum, was awarded the prestigious Milken Educator Award in November of 2023. This award, otherwise known as the "Oscars of Teaching," shines a spotlight on McIntosh's achievements in the education field. Her journey to excellence includes two degrees from Doane — a Master of Education in Curriculum and Instruction and a Master of Education in Educational Leadership.

The glowing recommendations from her colleagues and peers inspired her decision to pursue her degrees at Doane.

"Many other colleagues had wonderful experiences," McIntosh said. "Doane was an easy choice."

Her educational journey at Doane equipped her with insights and

But First, Baccalaureate

Graduating seniors reflect in interfaith environment the night before commencement

Dozens of students don their caps and gowns the evening before spring commencement. Not for a last-minute fitting, but for a unique opportunity to reflect on their Doane University experience.

The baccalaureate ceremony is open to all graduating students, their families and the university community. Over the last few years, the event has become more interfaith to reflect the diversity of religious backgrounds and spiritual identities of the student body.

Luis Sotelo, Vice President for Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion, said it's an important tradition to uphold.

"This interfaith baccalaureate is a special time for our students to reflect on how their religious, secular, and spiritual identities have inspired them on their educational journeys at Doane," Sotelo said.

Rev. Dr. Robert L. Polk '52, Doane's first Black graduate, was a guiding partner in this year's programming. He selected songs and hymns and delivered remarks about his time at Doane, his leadership in ministry, and his legacy as a lifelong bridge builder for positive change.

This year's baccalaureate was held in conjunction with a naming ceremony for the amphitheater south of the new residence hall: The Robert L. Polk Open Air Theatre.


Throughout his life, Rev. Dr. Polk has broken ground as "the first" Black person in work and other venues of his life. Bob persevered at Doane, even after being rejected for admission in 1949 initially and solely due to race, and he became the first African American to graduate from Doane. Even though Rev. Dr. Polk has witnessed and experienced blatant, harsh racial prejudice and bigotry throughout his lifetime, he has worked to build a more inclusive society no matter the circumstances. Rev. Dr. Polk says his Doane experience gave him the exposure, courage, wit, and wisdom to build bridges between race and culture. This has been the lifelong cornerstone of his ministry.



DON'T LEAVE CAMPUS YET!


Clues
