Course Info: BUS-101: Understanding the Environment of Business, 3 credit hours

Purpose: BUS-101 fulfills the requirement for a Foundational Area of Knowledge (FAK) in Global and Cultural Contexts. This course will assure that students gain a greater understanding of the foundations of the modern world and interconnections of global cultures. Students may address complex questions about race, gender, nationality, religion, law, economics, business and/or politics in order to understand multiple cultural perspectives and will work to:

1. Understand the evolution and development of cultural frameworks in the context of historical, political, social, religious, economic and/or legal structures
2. Interpret intercultural experiences from the perspectives of more than one worldview and demonstrate the ability to appreciate other cultures beyond their own experience
3. Create a refined empathetic understanding of a multifaceted world

More specifically, this course focuses on how domestic and global environments impact business practices and outcomes in today's changing business world.

Intended Audience: Students completing an undergraduate degree.

Material: Required Textbook: *Contemporary Business*, 16th edition, by Boone and Kurtz. Wiley Publisher, 2014.

Required Technology: Because this is an online course, student must have a computer, reliable Internet connection, an Internet browser, and Microsoft Word software.

Description: A survey course that introduces the functional concepts of business in terms of economic systems, global markets, corporate social responsibility, and the importance of small business to the American business system. Although the functional areas of business will be the cores of the course, it is not intended to present those areas in depth. Instead, all functional areas will be addressed using a stakeholder lens allowing students to become familiar with how and why businesses operate the way they do. (*Doane College Catalog*). This is an online course with a one time face-to-face meeting at Lincoln campus. The whole course is run on Blackboard (BB) platform.

Outcome: In addition to the FAK student learning outcomes, students successfully completing this course will be able to:

1. Demonstrate a basic understanding of business activities and theories.
2. Define capitalism and explain the basics of how free markets work. Discuss the forces that affect trading in global markets.

3. Define and explain entrepreneurship, management, marketing, and financial terminologies, theories and concepts.
4. Discuss the importance of small business in the American and global economies.

Strategy: To achieve the stated course outcomes and objectives, the combination of lectures, discussions, video clip, article, assignments, and tests will be used throughout the course, more specifically:

1. Weekly PowerPoint lectures will cover these learning areas: Business in a Global Environment, Starting and Growing Your Business, Management, Marketing Management, Managing Financial Resources.
2. Five discussions will be posted with specific topic related to the above learning areas.
3. Four assignments will be set up on BB with strong applications of textbook theories and concepts to the real business world.
4. An article analysis will be assigned to reinforce student's understand and application of basic business knowledge.
5. Two online multiple choices exams will be set up on BB to evaluate student learning progress, covering all assigned chapters.

Assessment: Assignments are designed to reinforce contemporary theories and policies. More importantly, all assignments have strong applications to the real world. All assignments are due and submitted through BB in Assignments tab as an attached file. No late, emailed, pasted, or hard copy assignment will be accepted. An Assignment Instruction file is posted on BB in Course Documents tab.

Discussion topics will be posted on different forums for student to respond. Topics will focus on how students would expand their thoughts on current business issues or principles. Discussion postings cannot be late and must be written in formal language and style. A Discussion Instruction file is posted in Course Documents tab.

Article analysis is a writing assignment that aims to develop student's critical thinking and analysis skills. Your task is to analyze an assigned article using at least 5 theories and/or concepts from the textbook and your personal experiences. An Article Analysis Instruction file will be posted on BB in Document tab.

Both exams will be set up in Assignments tab and have the multiple choices format. Exams are force completion (1 attempt only without breaks). Exam Review and Instruction files will be posted in Course Documents tab.
