Course Catalog Description

This course provides a review of nursing theories upon which practice is built and prepares the RN to become a consumer of research as it applies to the practice of nursing. Students

develop an understanding of both qualitative and quantitative research and how to determine appropriate methodology for a chosen study. Students develop skills for evaluating and critiquing existing research and learn how to apply ethical considerations to the practice of research. Upon completion of the course, students will understand the role of research in continuously improving health care.

Course Overview

Research is a major focus in nursing and the evidence generated from research is constantly changing nursing practice, education, and health policy. The role of research related to the Baccalaureate nurse consists of being able to read, critically appraise, and synthesize the research so the best evidence can be used to make changes in practice. The course consists of eight modules. Each module consists of assignments and discussions related to the research process. Students will work in various groups to gain a more in-depth understanding of the importance of research in nursing practice. The final project for the course consists of an effort by students to affect nursing practice based upon research findings.

- Critically appraise the literature review section of a published study
- Describe the purpose of a research study framework
- Critically appraise the design of published research studies
- Describe the concepts of probability, bias, control, and manipulation when

- examining causality in a research study
- Differentiate between internal validity and external validity

- Explain the importance of reliability and validity in the research process
- Critically appraise the data collection process of published studies
- Differentiate between descriptive and inferential statistics

- Summarize the influence of other organizations in the development, and promotion of nursing research

Course Requirements

Online Course

This is an online course and therefore there will not be any face-to-face class sessions. All assignments and course interactions will utilize internet-based technologies.
