Paraphrasing without citing the source is plagiarism.

In this class, you may be assigned to a group project. Responsibilities will be split among team members. No matter what role you play, as long as your name is on the assignment submitted for a grade, you are considered responsible for the entire project. If any of the assignment content violates Doane's policy on Academic Integrity or if any form of cheating takes place, each group member is responsible.
