## **Course Details**

# **Course description**

This course emphasizes the role of the professional nurse to contribute to a culture of health for groups, communities, and populations. Topics include health promotion, disease prevention, epidemiology, social determinants of health, and environmental health. Upon completion of the course, students will gain an understanding of the roles and responsibilities of the community health nurse. Prerequisites: ECO 203, ECO 329, LAR 101, LAR 202, NRS 220, and NRS 307. Cross-referenced with HSI 320.

- 2. Describe the meaning and characteristics of the community culture and the role of the professional nurse.
- 3. Describe the key concepts of collaboration with stakeholders and community partners to promote health across populations.

- 4. Analyze the socioeconomic, political, environmental, behavioral, biological and epidemiological factors that impact population health.
- 5. Develop objectives and strategies to apply concepts of community health/public health nursing to improve population health.
- 6. Create a community health project to improve population health for a defined community.

## **Instructional Details**

This course will use a combination of instructional approaches which may include, but are not limited to: large group discussion, small group discussion, written reflection, and papers based on assigned reading, videos, and lecture.
