Course Catalog Description

Rock and Roll is the music of youth, rebellion, and of the common spirit that ties all that together. Rock and Roll music tells the story of the human spirit involving controversy, tragedy, self-indulgence, love, sex, peace, and tranquility. This class will trace the history of Rock and Roll music from its rise as a blending of White and African-American music traditions amidst the youth oriented culture of post-World War II America to its subsequent diversification and internationalization. This history will be viewed in the context of the political, historical, economical, demographical, cultural and technological forces at work in the modern and postmodern world.

Learning Objectives

Course Objectives

At the completion of this course students will be able to:

1. Formulate an awareness of the major factors involved in the development of Rock and Roll from its roots to the present.
2. Respond to an aural awareness of the changing sounds of Rock and Roll over time.
3. Classify the subject of a pop song into cultural/social categories such as environment, peace/antiwar, sports, social upheaval, justice/injustice, civil rights, economics, gender roles in society, romantic love, sex, alienation, introspection, counter culture, etc...

Unit Objectives (Units are set up as 1 week modules)

Module I: Introduction to the Course

- a. Introduce yourself to the class and interact with classmates.
- b. Orient yourself to the Blackboard course and course expectations.
- c. Create a Twitter account.

Module II: Roots of Rock and Roll

- a. Describe the infusion of Black Roots and White Roots on Rock and Roll.
- b. Describe how technology influenced the Record Industry.
- c. Analyze and describe the musical elements in the song "Strange Fruit".

Module III: Rock and Roll Explosion

- a. Describe how Elvis impacted the evolution of early Rock and Roll and his influences on American pop culture.
- b. Describe the influence of the Brill Building songwriters.
- c. Summarize the impact of Buddy Holly on the next generation of pop artists.

Module IV: Soul and Folk Influences

- a. Describe the characteristics of soul music and the connection to the civil rights movement.
- b. Analyze the musical elements of Motown and Stax.
- c. Describe the folk music influences between Bob Dylan and Woodie Guthrie.
- d. Compare and contrast the musical elements and social implications of black protest songs of the 60s.

Module V: British Invasion

- a. Compare and contrast the musical influences of the Rolling Stones to the Beatles.
- b. Identify the social issues that led to the formation of a youth counterculture of the 1960s
- c. Describe how Jimi Hendrix changed the sound of rock music.
- d. Summarize the connection between the turbulent events of the 1960's and the music reflected in this decade.

Module VI: The Seventies

- a. Describe the characteristics of the music and of the singer/songwriters that emerged in the 1970's.
- b. Compare the characteristics that defined Heavy Metal versus Hard Rock.
- c. Create a graphic organizer representing the various music genres of the 1970s.

Module VII: Punk Rock

- a. Interpret the origins of Hip Hop with relation to the social changes in America.
- b. Describe how reggae was used for social protest, and describe its relationship to the Rastafarian movement
- c. Compare the lyrics of four songs by women rock artists in the influence on the women's liberation movement.

Module VIII: 80's, 90's, & Beyond

- a. Describe the impacts of new technology on the music business.
- b. Compare and contrast the characteristics of alternative rock bands and boy/girl bands of the 90's.
- c. Select and summarize the life of one of the top artists of this time period (Jackson, Madonna, Prince, Springsteen).

Module IX: Encore

- a. Create a top 10 favorite list of rock music
- b. Identify the music of the past 60+ years by decade, style, and genre.
- c. Compose a final paper reflecting on the influence of rock and roll music on American society.

Course Requirements

Online Course

This is an online course and therefore there will not be any face-to-face class sessions. All assignments and course interactions will utilize internet-based technologies.

Attendance Policy

You should plan to work on this course everyday. This means that you must have a reliable and consistent internet connection throughout the duration of the course. It is strongly recommended that you not take any vacations during this course. This is a condensed, fast-paced course and it would be extremely difficult to catch up after a prolonged absence.

The course requires you to spend time preparing and completing assignments. A three-credit course requires 144 hours of student work. Therefore expect to spend approximately 18 hours a week preparing for and actively participating in this 8-week course.
